Children to colour in the map of UK of Anglo-Saxon.  Research Bretwalda and King Offa. Write a short paragraph about each.
Historical interpretation	Look at different versions of the same event and identify differences in the accounts.  Give clear reasons why there may be different accounts of history.  Know that people (now and in past) can represent events or ideas in ways that persuade others	How was Anglo-Saxon Britain ruled? And by whom? Was Britain was a united kingdom or not? What did the word 'Bretwalda' mean? What can you tell about King Offa? Think about this: How did the role of women differ in Ancient Roman, Celtic and Anglo-Saxon societies? What were early Anglo-Saxon beliefs? How did this change? What can we learn from Anglo-Saxon graves? What is Sutton Hoo? Who were the Vikings and when and where did they come from?	Children to research Sutton Hoo and create a ppt presentation.  Children to act as detectives and investigate a ship burial.
Historical Enquiry	Use documents, printed sources, the internet, databases, pictures, photos, music, artefacts, historic buildings and visits to collect information about the past.  Ask a range of questions about the past.  Choose reliable sources of evidence to answer questions.  Realise that there is often not a single answer to historical questions.	Understand how some kings in Britain dealt with the Viking invaders. Discuss and record facts known and facts to research about the British kings. How do you think they felt about it?  To understand how Vikings lived and worked.  To understand what happened during the Viking invasions and know what Viking warriors were like. What were Viking warriors like? Can children draw a picture? What weapons did they use? Why were they such successful raiders and invaders?  To identify and describe Viking artefacts. How do artefacts help us to work out what life was like in the past? What types of evidence sources have been found? To know some Viking gods and what they represent	Map activity.
