Dear Saint John's families,

The weather has changed and the leaves are falling: we find ourselves in Autumn! The Car Park

But considering it was enough to make our whole car shudder, it can be assumed that the driver knew it had hit something yet drove away.

I have to be honest that I am quite shocked to hear about this and am very concerned about the risk of harm to anyone, local residents or our school community.

Two other requests please:

Keep home toys at home. It is far better for children to play with the toys and resources that we have here, rather than risking loss, breakage or arguments about ownership. We do allow cards currently, but will continue to review this depending on the impact these cards have. Please ensure that you **inform the office about absence** and that you seek permission if it is anything other than illness. Vomiting and diarrhoea mean 48 hours not in school, a temperature does not: hopefully, this helps you know what to say to the office when you contact them!

The **Reception** children have been learning repeating patterns in maths, both copying and continuing a repeating pattern and making up one of their own. It was lovely to see all sorts of equipment and natural materials being used in the children's repeated patterns, including shells, conkers and sticks! As part of their introduction to maths and realising that maths is all around us and not just a lesson, we have introduced self registration using tens frames. This runs alongside the formal register. The children find their photo and stick it onto the tens frame. They then use these to count how many children are in class that day. The children are already recognising a full tens frame, know that 2 full tens frames are 20, plus a full top line is another 5. Well done, children! They are becoming great mathematicians!









Year 1 have ben busy creating drawings of pumpkins. The children were able to apply their drawing skills and knowledge from their previous lessons to create an observational drawing piece that allowed them to experiment with marks and materials.









As part of the introduction to their persuasive writing unit, Mrs Roper and Ms Wynn tried to persuade the **Year 2** children to choose their choice of biscuit to eat. They both chose adjectives, verbs and sayings to entice the children!







Year 3 have been learning how to line dance in PE and have also put a lot of effort into producing amazing leaflets to sum up their learning about the Iron Age. They have thought carefully about our big question and decided which period of prehistory they would have liked to live in.







Year 4 returned to school on Monday to find evidence of a dragon having visited their classroom over the half-term break! They had to look at all the evidence and write a police report.
